Your generosity makes it possible for mothers to find loving adoptive families for their children. Thank you for being a part of this life-saving work!



Choosing to give your baby up for adoption is a heart-wrenching decision. It takes courage, trust, and sacrificial love. But mothers who choose adoption can be sure that God has a beautiful plan for their little one: "For I know the plans I have for you, says the LORD, plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope" (Jer. 29:11).

Crissy experienced this providential care firsthand. When she was just 15 years old, she came to the Saint Gianna & Pietro Molla Maternity Home, pregnant and looking for help.

Although Crissy chose life for her child, she knew she couldn't give her baby Gracie the life she deserved. She decided to find an adoptive family for Gracie. Little did she know the amazing plan God had in store for her daughter.

began searching for a family for Gracie. When she saw Brent and Carla's profile, she knew immediately that they were the parents God had in mind. "Their profile was the first adoptive family I looked at," Crissy says. "I said they are the ones (although I was told I should look through everyone before deciding who to meet)."

On the Feast of the Epiphany, Crissy placed her daughter in Brent and Carla's arms. Now, years later, Crissy is a nurse manager with three more children of her own. When Crissy attended our 20th anniversary reunion, she had the chance to spend time with Brent, Carla, and Gracie. She left with a full and grateful heart.

"What a beautiful weekend," Crissy says. "Most special of all is always Gracie! She's grown into a beautiful teenager over the years. She is exactly who I imagined her to be when I placed her in Carla and Brent's arms 15 years ago. To see her love for her mom and dad and theirs for her makes me know for sure that God knew the plan before I did."

Crissy knows there can be a lot of judgment cast on women who give their children up for adoption. But she hopes stories like hers will show what a beautiful, self-sacrificial gift adoption can be for everyone involved.

Homily by Father Joseph Christensen, FMI at the 20th Anniversary Reunion of Birth and Adoptive Parents

I welcome everyone here today as we celebrate adoption, celebrate life. It's interesting that throughout our history as a people of God, the blessings of adoption are displayed many times in the Old and New Testament.

Let's look at the Book of Esther. Esther's parents passed away, and her cousin Mordecai adopted her and brought her up. When Queen Vashti was removed, and the king needed another queen, various women were brought before the king. Esther was very beautiful, and he chose her. She became the queen. And because she was the queen, God used that circumstance to save the Jews from destruction. Esther went to the king and pleaded on their behalf, and they were all saved because of her role as queen, and because of the adoption of Mordecai.

And of course, there's Moses. After three months, he was put in a basket and set afloat in the water. When Pharaoh's daughter discovered a little baby crying, she pulled him out of the water. Pharaoh was killing little baby boys, but his daughter took Moses and adopted him. That's what Moses means, that he was drawn out of the water.

Moses was the intermediary between God and God's people. For 40 years, he led them, helped them, taught them about God, interceded for them, received the Commandments and so forth. He led God's people out of Egypt, which really meant out of slavery—and especially slavery to sin—to the Promised Land. And so that's Moses, who was also adopted.

St. Paul, in his letter to the Galatians, also speaks about adoption. "But when the time had fully come," he says, "God sent forth his son, born of a woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law so that we might receive adoption as sons" (and of course as daughters).

"Because you are sons and daughters, God has sent the spirit of his Son into your hearts crying out, 'Abba! Father!" (Gal. 4:6) Or another translation would be Daddy. We all, through Baptism, have been adopted by God to become part of God's family, which is tremendous. It goes on for all eternity, that adoption, and the effects are eternal and redemptive and glorious.

"We got married about 13 years ago. But we had our struggles with fertility. We started working with an agency in Fargo and adopted our oldest daughter here, Genevieve, who's here with us tonight. We wanted to adopt again but we weren't having any luck at all. Nothing was really working.

Then one day when I was at work in Fargo, I got a call on my cell phone from our neighbor in Grand Forks. She told us about Theodore and Saint Gianna's, and so we met Father Joseph and Mary Pat and Theodore. Theodore's now a little over two years old. Genevieve loves being a big sister. He's been fantastic. So thank you for everything."

Sacrificial love

We reflect today on God's gift of life, the many lives that are here today. And we definitely need to talk about [adoption], we need to celebrate this, we need others to know that there's options other than abortion, than taking innocent life.

When so many of you want to give of yourselves, want to bring someone into your family and love them, hopefully we can remove that stigma that surrounds adoption and show how beautiful it is and what a gift it is to everyone involved.

Each of you has your own story, with struggles and hardships, but also joys. You see the security of those who have been adopted, their security of being loved and wanted. We all need to be loved and wanted. Every human being has that basic need. And adoption fulfills that need.

We highlight especially the sacrificial love of the birth mother and of the adopted family. There's no greater love than one who lays down his life for another. Christ did that. He gave us that first example. And that's the highest form of

love when we sacrifice ourselves. You spouses do that for one another and for your children. We're made in God's image and likeness, so we're made to be generous. We're made to give and to share.

That's all that God does, is give and give and give and give. When you're tired of giving, reflect on that and draw strength from that and ask the Lord to help you. Mother Teresa was once asked, how much should you give? She said, "Give until it hurts." And probably many of you have. We pray that that continues because our world needs that beautiful example—that display of the divine love, of sacrificial love, of agape love.

A birth mother's beautiful gift

The birth mother finds herself, for whatever reason, in a situation she never imagined and just not in the place to be able to give her child what is needed. And yet she loves her child very much and so is willing to place her child in the arms of the adoptive parents. Difficult? Yes, very difficult. Unimaginably so.

Loving? Yes. Again, it's a sacrificial love that wants the best for her child. A blessing? Absolutely. It's a blessing for the mother, for the child, and for the adoptive family. We celebrate this love, this respect for life. And we thank the birth mother for giving life and cherishing the life that she gave birth to.

A person trustworthy in very small matters is also trustworthy in great ones. God has entrusted you with great treasures. You have been entrusted with a human person—a human life that matters, that's eternal, never ends. There's nothing more valuable, nothing.

We rejoice with you today and ask God's blessings upon you, that these graces, these gifts, the sharing of lives, will continue and that others will see the joy that you have. Because you have given, as St. Francis said, you will receive more.

"We waited for four years for this day through different things. We were on the list in another adoption agency for so long, and everything was hard. A friend told us about Saint Gianna's, so we contacted Mary Pat and we just thought, okay, if it doesn't work this time, then we're done. We're just going to be happy with the two of us. I remember getting a phone call about meeting Jacob's birth mom. We met her in the Green Mill in Grand Forks and we didn't know if she was going

to pick us or not. And so we went out, and Mary Pat came running out of the Green Mill and waving her arms and relayed that she (Jacob's birth mom, Sam) picked you! Then we waited and waited some more and got a phone call at 4:00 in the morning that Jacob was coming. We drove in a snowstorm up to Grand Forks and he was born on the way. And everything was easy from that point on. It was hard, but it all worked. Jacob has been the biggest blessing for our lives."



Brooklynn

Ryan and I were married in the fall of 2016 and we knew right away that we would want to start a family. I had a known fertility condition, and Oliver here was our little miracle. But when I was 10 weeks pregnant, I was hit by an oncoming semi. And so he endured two rounds of general anesthesia and reconstructive surgeries for my legs while he was in utero. And then my body shut down at 25 weeks. So he was born at one pound, and he's a little miracle. After that experience, we were pretty scared about trying to conceive again, so we put it in God's hands and we just prayed that if it's meant to be, it'll happen on its own. But when we became pregnant again, our second-born son was stillborn in the hospital.

After we lost our little guy, I'm no longer able to carry children. And we've put our names down for traditional adoption and we've been on a wait list for over four years and we're still on the wait list to apply. So about two and a half years ago, we decided to become a licensed foster home. Through foster care, we've been blessed to have two little beautiful baby girls. The second we had from when she was newborn till just over a year old. We were devastated when she was reunified very unexpectedly, but then extremely blessed when we got her back along with her big brother. And then four months to the day after getting those two sweet peanuts, we had our adoption ceremony here for little Brooklyn. So we are extremely blessed and praying hard that we can keep all four.
