Life is Beautiful!

When Mother Teresa died on September 5th, 1997a day I will never forget-Cardinal John O' Connor (who founded the Sisters of Life in 1991), released a statement that said: "The world has both lost and gained a great Saint." I have pondered these words over many years and in different situations. Those of us who grew up when Mother Teresa was alive were deeply moved by her doing so much good in the world, work that the Missionaries of Charity now continue; she was such a tremendous source of inspiration to me and to so many. Her simplicity, humility, and tremendous fortitude, and her ability to speak and to live so profoundly in her service to Christ in the poorest of the poor Saint Mother Teresa has also inspired me and countless others. 

Marriage and family life is often a delicate balance of "yes" and "no" as the couple and family discern where God is leading them as they journey towards heaven. We write to you today as one of the many families that love and cherish the St. Gianna Maternity Home. We are Matthew and Sarah Effhauser, we have been married for 15 years and we live with our now 6 children in rural East Grand Forks. We just completed an international adoption of the sweetest little boy with Down syndrome from Eastern Europe.

Sarah had always had a heart for orphans throughout their marriage, especially those with Down syndrome and although Matthew felt called to pray for them often, adding one of these precious children to their family was an entirely different calling. In the spring of 2019, we both knew it was time to make a step towards adoption and Sarah resigned from her teaching position to start the transition to being home full time. The moments of discernment that ended in "no" and "not yet" were starting to turn into a "yes" after years of patience and prayer. As each step towards adoption was met with consolation, we continued to look at profiles of waiting children. In late June, 2020 as the world was closed, we found the profile of the sweetest little boy waiting in Serbia and knew it was now our time for "yes".

Starting an international adoption in the midst of the pandemic was not for the faint of heart and although we had our home study and dossier compiled in record time and God opened so many generous hearts to help fund our adoption, it would still be an entire year before we would be invited to travel and bring home our son. A wait we never expected to endure.

On February 14th, we sat in a small playroom of his orphanage as we heard little footsteps and gentle voice come down the hall. As our sweet boy came around the corner into the room, his eyes were wide and curious. A whole new life awaited him and until this moment, he had no understanding of what was unfolding. Meeting, holding and playing with our son for the very first time are moments we will forever cherish. The culmination of many, many prayers and the beginning of a new chapter in our family. We spent three weeks in country to finalize our adoption and arrived home the first week of March.

As we spent our days in Serbia getting to know one another, we had an overwhelming sense of consolation that all the moments of "no" along the journey, intertwined into our marriage and family life, were always for this "yes". Yes to making changes to our work-family balance. Yes to adoption amidst a pandemic. Yes to humbly asking others to come along side us in prayer and financial support. Yes to opening our home to the lonely. Yes to waiting. **Yes to our son**.

We will forever be grateful to the St. Gianna's community for their prayers and support. Not only is the St. Gianna's Maternity Home a champion for the lives of mothers and babies that they serve, they are truly a champion for life.

As we settle into family life of 8 here in Minnesota, our schedules are bustling with sports, school, doctors and therapy. Our days are full but our hearts are overflowing. There are plenty of hard moments but they are the hard and holy moments that build up the Domestic Church in family life. As our dear St. Gianna said herself, **"The secret of happiness is to live moment by moment and to thank God for all that He, in His goodness, sends to us day after day."** And thankful we are.

"I implore you to hear and answer Pietro's prayers, 'coming from a heart that has always loved You and served You in a saintly way', so that, through his intercession, I may receive this grace which I humbly ask of You . . ."

– from the Prayer for Private Devotion for the intercession of Pietro Molla. The portion within single quotation marks was written by Saint Gianna about her husband. The full prayer was written by their daughter, Gianna Emanuela Molla.

Dr. Michelle Bianco took a sip of tea before quietly sharing more of her story. Seated on a couch on a sunny winter day at Saint Gianna's Maternity Home in Warsaw, ND, Michelle spoke softly and deliberately about her deep love for her family, her terminal diagnosis, and her Catholic faith that sustains her through the uncertainty.

Soon a voice burst through a cell phone's FaceTime app and the smile and words of the daughter of a Saint greeted Michelle. **"Be assured of my daily prayers with all my heart," Gianna Emanuela Molla told Michelle from thousands of miles away in Italy.**

Sadly Gianna Emanuela cannot remember her mother, Saint Gianna Beretta Molla, who sacrificed her health and life for her, dying when Gianna Emanuela was only a few days old. While celebrating God's goodness in giving her a Saint Mother, Gianna Emanuela is striving to further the cause of canonization for her father, Pietro Molla, who provided a holy example to her and many others.

"This is the place where my dad always would sit down," Gianna Emanuela showed Michelle through the phone screen, speaking English masterfully through her strong Italian accent. "I lived here all my life with my holy dad," she continued. "Living with him I could see his example."

"He lost my mom and he lost my sister," Gianna Emanuela said of her father. **"He always found his strength in the sacraments and in prayer."**

"I talk to the Lord like I'm talking to you now," she told Michelle. "I say, 'Lord, you hear my mom's prayers. Please hear also my dad's prayers'."

"God himself said you have to ask . . . so we do what God suggests us to do," Gianna Emanuela said. "I pray to my holy Dad. We pray for a miracle because nothing is impossible with God."

Interceding for a miracle for Michelle

Fr. Joseph Christianson, FMI, spiritual director of Saint Gianna's Maternity Home, asked Michelle if he, Gianna Emanuela and the others present could pray for her. Michelle immediately agreed and moved to a chair near him.

He took a shawl from the Shrine of Saint Gianna in the maternity home's chapel and placed it upon Michelle's shoulders. Over her head he held a beautiful gold reliquary. In unison, Gianna Emanuela through FaceTime from Italy and the others gathered with Michelle at the maternity home, prayed for the intercession of Pietro Molla for the healing of Michelle.

A young physician, like Saint Gianna was, Michelle had recently been given a diagnosis that neither she, nor anyone else in the medical community, knows how to heal. She will need a miracle to stop the disease's progression. And Pietro needs miracles attributed to his intercession to advance the cause for his saint-hood.

A mother's sacrifice

Saint Gianna, an Italian physician, wife and mother, was diagnosed with a large fibroma (benign, tumor-like growth) when she was newly pregnant with Gianna Emanuela. She was given three options: surgically removing both the fibroma and her uterus which held her unborn baby, or ending the pregnancy through abortion and then removing the fibroma, or removing the fibroma and allowing the pregnancy to continue at great risk to Saint Gianna.

In Giuliana Pelucchi's book *St. Gianna: Her Life of Joy and Heroic Sacrifice*, Pietro tells of his wife's decision: "Gianna chose the last solution, the one that involved the most risk for her. In those days it was indeed foreseeable that childbirth after such an intervention would be extremely dangerous for the mother. And Gianna, as a physician, knew it very well."

A few paragraphs later, he is quoted again: "To understand her decision . . . we cannot forget Gianna's profound conviction, as a mother and as a physician, that the child she bore within her was a

complete child with the same rights as the other children, even though she had been conceived scarcely two months before. The child was a gift from God, deserving sacred respect."

The procedure to remove the tumor took place September 6, 1961. Saint Gianna remained hospitalized for a time because of concern of a miscarriage. Eventually she was allowed to go home to her husband and children and resume her work as a physician. On April 20 – Good Friday – 1962, Saint Gianna entered the hospital where she gave birth to Gianna Emanuela the next day. She was able to hold and gaze upon her little daughter, her fourth child, before Saint Gianna's condition began to worsen. When death was very near, Pietro remembered his wife's desire to return to their home before her death, so he "arranged to have her transported by ambulance to lie within the walls that, for too few years, had seen her as a happy wife and mother . . . She was placed on the bed in the room that she shared with her husband. Her children were sleeping in the adjoining room. Pietro did not dare awaken them. He remained beside his dearest Gianna, who breathed her last at eight o'clock in the morning," Giuliana Pelucchi wrote. Saint Gianna died at age 39 on April 28, the first Saturday after Easter.

"On May 16, 2004, Gianna Beretta Molla was proclaimed a saint in the presence of her family: her beloved husband Pietro with her three living children, Pierluigi, Laura and Gianna Emanuala," Giuliana Pelucchi wrote. In 1964, their oldest daughter, Mariolina, died of inflammation of the kidneys, less than two years after Saint Gianna's death. Mariolina, who was six years old, died while reciting the Hail Mary prayer.

Blessed as mothers chose life

Michelle Bianco, who lives in Horace, ND, grew up in Moorhead, MN, and attended St. Joseph's Catholic School and parish there. She graduated from Shanley High School, across the river in Fargo, ND, and later graduated from North Dakota State University, Fargo, with a degree in nutrition. Michelle worked in a Boston hospital for a time as a registered dietitian. While working, she studied pre-med through Harvard Extension in the evenings. She eventually graduated from medical school through the University of North Dakota, Grand Forks. After completing a residency in pathology and a fellowship in hematology at the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics, Michelle served as a hematopathologist for MeritCare, which later became Sanford Health, in Fargo, working primarily with the Roger Maris Cancer Center there.

She and her husband, Robert, wanted to begin a family but, for unknown reasons, couldn't conceive. So they began the journey toward adoption. They waited 11 months before they were able to hold their first adopted daughter, Anna, only two hours after she was born. The next adoption took longer. The first birth mother changed her mind and decided to keep her child upon birth. Fortunately a second birth mother chose Michelle and Robert as adoptive parents for her child, and they welcomed their second daughter, Elise, into their family after a three-year wait.

"We were blessed to adopt because their mothers chose life," Michelle said.

Both Robert and Michelle were raised with one parent at home and they wanted the same for their children. They decided that Robert, who has a doctorate degree in biochemistry, would be the at-home parent while Michelle continued to work as a physician.

In April 2021, Michelle began noticing that something was not right with her health. Based on her symptoms, Michelle had a good idea what might be happening. "I went to three doctors before I got someone to believe me and send me to neurology," Michelle said. In October 2021, a neurologist in Fargo referred her to Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN, for further testing and consultation. It was at Mayo that she was diagnosed with the early stages of Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), also known as Lou Gehrig's disease. The disease, for which there is no known cure, results in the progressive loss of voluntary muscle control.

"My type of Lou Gehrig's is Bulbar. It affects my speech and swallowing before it affects my arms and legs," Michelle said. "In my case, they think it is familial, meaning that I inherited it."

"If I had had a biological child, I would have a 50 percent change of giving the mutation or bad gene" to the child, Michelle explained. After her diagnosis, "it all made sense as to why we couldn't have kids. I think we were blessed twice."

Michelle expressed how grateful she is to her husband and daughters. She and Robert will have been married 22 years on June 23, 2022. Anna is 17 and Elise will be 12 this summer. "My husband is a very strong person. He's been my rock," Michelle said. "I think that he's pushed his grief aside and he's focused on taking care of me and the girls."

A gift for the future

Michelle first learned about St. Gianna's Maternity Home from a friend of Anna's. The friend had lived at the maternity home when she was little, while her mother was pregnant with her second child.

"It's odd, but not odd. When I knew something was very wrong [with my health]" Michelle said, "something drew me to look up St. Gianna's and, in the August newsletter, they talked about the house and that they were going to take a loan out [to build it]. And something just struck me." Michelle feels it was the Holy Spirit who brought it to her attention.

The board of directors of Saint Gianna Maternity Home had decided and announced through the newsletter that they would be building a house on the grounds of St. Gianna Maternity Home. The house would provide more room and privacy for current and future staff members and offer additional meeting and office space. The opportunity to live in the new house would be part of the compensation plan for staff members. "We want to best prepare for the future of Saint Gianna's Maternity Home, and a significant part of sustaining our mission is providing adequate and appropriate living accommodations for our staff," the newsletter article stated.

Michelle was working with Jan Nelson of Heartland Trust in Fargo at the time to see how she could financially benefit worthy projects as she dealt with her terminal diagnosis. She told Jan she wanted to check into donating to the maternity home project. Soon a meeting between Michelle, Jan, Mary Pat Jahner, director of the maternity home, and Fr. Joseph Christensen, FMI, spiritual director, was held. WELCOME TO

"After I came back from Mayo in November, I, through Jan, wanted to

meet them," Michelle said. "As I told them, when I first met them, I said I'm not a saint, **but I felt a connection with Saint** Gianna as she was a physician and Italian, which I am, and prolife obviously." She also felt connected because Saint Gianna was a mother, a role which is so important to Michelle in her own life.

Michelle chose to make a donation that would cover the expenses of building the home. Much of the construction work thus far has been completed by volunteers, but materials and the paid construction work will be covered by the gift from Michelle and her family. The home will be dedicated to Michelle and Robert's daughters with a plaque that reads: "Welcome to La Vita é Bella. This home is dedicated by Robert and Michelle Bianco to their cherished daughters Anna and Elise. May all who enter here show gratitude to God for life and for this home, bestowed through a gift from the Bianco family and the time and talents of those who made it a reality. **Indeed, Life is Beautiful**". (The Italian phrase "La Vita é Bella" means "life is beautiful").

Michelle spoke of her hope for Saint Gianna's Maternity Home, "I want it to continue to grow and be here and I think that having the house is what is important for the mission here to continue. It's not the only thing, of course. There are so many people involved and volunteers – but having the building and space they need is important."

God provides

Although interest rates were low, making it a good time to take out a loan for the house, Mary Pat struggled with the idea.

At the end of August 2021, they had begun the process to apply for the loan and were ready to sign the papers, but things were unsettled. Mary Pat's father died on September 2, then the coronavirus made its way through those at the maternity home. Finally, the night before Mary Pat was to sign the loan application papers, "I just got a sickened feeling – not because you can't take out a loan or not because a loan is bad. It's just that we never have here. We've always trusted God and God has always provided for us."

She expressed her thoughts to Colleen Samson, president of the board. "I remember calling Colleen and Colleen is such a

woman of faith." Colleen responded "absolutely!" to Mary Pat's idea of waiting for a while. At the next board meeting, they decided to hold off on applying for the loan at least until the end of the year. "It was in November that we got the email from Jan" asking if a building project was going on that was in need of funding, Mary Pat said. I thought, "Could this even be true?"


After more emails and conversations and then the meeting with Michelle, God once again provided for the maternity home.

"God is taking care of this work here through you and through your sacrifice and struggle," Mary Pat told Michelle. "The story gets a lot more beautiful and a lot more hard, too."

Turning to God is everything!

"I think that we all have gifts and we can use them at different times in our lives," Michelle said. "God gave me the gift of intelligence and, hopefully, I served a good purpose [as a physician]. And now I think he's given me as an example of what you can do when you're faced with what is considered a terminal diagnosis."

"Everybody has challenges and hardships," she said, "but I think that turning to God instead of away from him is, I mean, is everything! And you can still have purpose and share yourself and what you have."

What does she feel her purpose is at this time? "I think, first, I can be an example of Christ and also be a witness of God's love."

Michelle reached for a book she brought along to the maternity home. Entitled *Meditations from a Simple Path*, it includes quotes from **Mother Teresa** (now known as Saint Teresa of Calcutta). Michelle pointed out a quote: **"Everything is God's to give and to take away, so share what you've been given**, and that includes yourself."

"I think this is an important message," Michelle said.

Asked if her faith has changed through her experience with Lou Gehrig's disease, Michelle said. "The nice thing is I have more time to pray and I feel a lot of peace when I can pray, and I feel closer to God. I really feel his presence." Her mouth then involuntarily moved, unnoticeably except to her. "I'm having some shaking – that happens," she said with humble acceptance.

Then she continued. "In the beginning, I prayed more for myself, but now I find I pray more for others."

"This morning the prayer I said that just came to me, but I think it's good thing for everyone. I said 'thank you for my life' and then I said 'help me live it well today.' Because what I have learned since all this is gratitude and living in the present," Michelle shared.

Michelle's faith was echoed that day in the powerful and comforting words of Gianna Emanuela, speaking to Michelle from Italy.

"The greatest gift we can have is our faith," Gianna Emanuela said. "We know that our life is completely in God's holy hands and so it could not be in better hands."
